Our late spring may have been good for Bay Lake

Is there an upside to the long winter? I'm thinking yes. It will reduce the growing season of Eurasian watermilfoil and delay the onslaught of boat launches into Bay Lake, perhaps reducing the likelihood of zebra mussels being brought into the lake. How's that for a positive attitude?

Highlights of the past six months

- Although the state legislature is still in session and several Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)-related bills have been proposed, at this time it does not appear that BLIA (Bay Lake Improvement Association) will receive any financial or other support from the state.
- DNR (Department of Natural Resources) will offer the same programs as in recent years.
- Crow Wing County has organized the hiring and assigning of Class 1 inspectors for various lakes within the county, with lake associations paying for the inspectors.
- BLIA will continue our volunteer monitor program.
- Bay Lake Township is installing a gate at the rough public access point off Brighton Point Road.

More Class 1 inspectors

The cost of inspecting boats and monitoring boat ramps continues to fall almost entirely on lake associations like ours. For the coming season, it is estimated we will spend up to \$17,000 on DNR-trained Class 1 inspectors.

DNR will continue recent programs, including some "complimentary" inspector hours, monitor training and the operation of a handful of mobile decontamination stations posted at different points around the state.

At the county level, however, there is really good news: Crow Wing County has hired and assigned as many as six Class 1 inspectors to the Bay Lake public ramp. We anticipate they will monitor our main public





access weekly, every Thursday though Sunday. Class 1 inspectors have the authority to board a boat and, if evidence of AIS is found, send the boat to be decontaminated. Details are still being sorted out, but I feel very positive about this increased level of inspection for Bay Lake.

As part of our continuing efforts to have all incoming and outgoing boats inspected at the main public ramp on Battle Point Road, last fall BLIA asked the Bay Lake Township to consider installing a gate at an unmonitored lake access point off Brighton Point Road. This gate will essentially close the access to boats in summer, while allowing winter access for snowmobiles and ice fishermen. The township board held a public hearing on the matter last October; many Bay Lakers attended and spoke in support of the request. Over the winter, the township board

Your \$30 yearly dues pay for the twice-yearly publication of the Breezes, printing and mailing of BLIA event promotions, placement and replacement of the buoys, printing of the decals, and the upkeep of our database. We have not raised the dues amount for quite a few years, feeling that we want to be as fiscally responsible as possible, and that we do not want the dues amount to keep anyone from being able to join.

So remember: 600 is our goal. See you at the Annual Meeting!

Long winter frustrated us, but should slow EWM growth this year

If there is any good news about this past winter, it's that the EWM (Eurasian watermilfoil) should be fairly light this year. The heavy snow cover all winter and late ice-out should slow EWM growth, which will be an advantage to native species during the upcoming growing season.

We have been fortunate the last several years to have the weather on our side, making our efforts to control EWM that much easier. The way we conduct our treatments in years like this allows the native species to fill in and actually crowd out EWM.

In 2012 we treated 55 acres using liquid 2,4-d. The treatments and our plan continue to be very effective, and we will work the same plan again. Buddy Divers will do a full lake survey starting around Memorial Day, and Lake Restoration will conduct a treatment at the end of June. They will survey again around Labor Day and do treatments in the first part of October.

Please sign approval form

We are required to have your authorization to chemically treat for EWM, and we need your approval again. You should have received a letter from the BLIA asking for your signature authorizing the association to chemically treat along your shoreline out to 150 feet.

Without this approval we will not treat along your shore. In the past your response to this request has been fantastic. There will be only one mailing, so please respond ASAP by sending your authorization in the stamped return envelope. This approval will be good for five years this time.

Later this summer we will be asking you to inspect your shoreline for EWM and zebra mussels and to report back. Your response has been very helpful in the past, and I expect it will be again this season.

Monitoring for AIS

Our volunteer program to monitor the public access for Aquatic Invasive Species will continue. Phil and Jane Rollins are doing a great job with this program to keep zebra mussels out of Bay Lake and need your help. EWM is very controllable, but zebra mussels are not. Your efforts volunteering at the pubic access might just save the lake from an ecological disaster.

Your support over the years has been fantastic and the reason we have been able to do what we have done. Please continue to support the Bay Lake Improvement Association Environmental

approved the proposal, and BLIA is providing the financial support to pay for the gate and its installation.

Last but not least, many of our volunteer monitors have indicated that they will put in some hours again on the public boat ramp. However, we never have enough and continue to seek new volunteers willing to give two to four hours over the summer — not much to ask considering the ramifications of zebra mussels or other AIS finding their way into Bay Lake.

Keep in mind that more than 100 Minnesota lakes and waters are now infested with zebra mussels — 12 in Crow Wing County alone, including Gull, Mille Lac, and the

Mississippi and Pine Rivers. Only 20 Minnesota lakes were infested just two years ago. That's a 500 percent increase! And from our monitors' data, we know boaters who frequent infected waters bring their boats to Bay Lake. We are at risk and could use more help.

Looking forward to another great Runtilla July 20
