

Optimist or pessimist about zebra mussels?

With the continued expansion of zebra mussels and other invasive species into Minnesota lakes and rivers, some say our prevention efforts are a waste of time and money. Some say that given the large number of boats that access contaminated lakes, it's a virtual certainty that over time, watercraft will spread invasives to all popular Minnesota lakes and rivers.


Your BLIA Board sees it differently. We believe that the cost of DNR (Department of Natural Resources) inspectors and the volunteer time spent administering the prevention program are well worth each season that passes without new invasives. And for each year that passes without a new infestation, scientists are one year closer to



finding a solution to the zebra mussel contamination. Although we can't know for certain, it's likely our robust inspection program has helped keep us free of zebras and other new invasives. So yes, we will be optimistic and continue our inspection program in the 2014 season.

Over the past several years, we have watched as some of the most well-known local waterways, such as Gull, the Whitefish Chain, Pelican and the Mississippi, to name a few, have become invaded by zebras. So far, Bay Lake is not on that list. One important factor working in our favor is that we have only one public access. While some other area lakes have multiple access points, which makes the monitoring or inspecting of boats difficult or impossible, we are blessed with only one. And with only one, we can focus all of our efforts there. Imagine the challenge of trying to inspect boats on two or three or five different access points.

Another critical factor for Bay is the strong financial and volunteer support provided by the BLIA membership and community. The 2014 BLIA public access inspection program



has a budget of \$26,500, most of which is used to pay for DNR Class 1 inspectors. With this continued support, in 2014 we will be scheduling DNR inspectors from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily, May 10 through mid-September.

To enhance the program, we applied for and were awarded DNR grant funding to subsidize up to 500 hours of DNR inspection time, equal to about \$4,000. And we will again utilize the iLids camera on the access, which captures video of each launch and retrieval. Many of the videos are reviewed, and if regulation violations are observed, boaters are reported to the DNR.

Our volunteer monitors continue to play an important role in the overall program. With the best of intentions, the scheduling of DNR inspectors isn't perfect, and there have been and will continue to be times when

With heavy snow cover, late ice-out, EWM should be light this year

After a brutal winter, there should be a silver lining! And that is that the EMW (Eurasian watermilfoil) should be fairly light this year. The heavy snow cover all winter and late ice-out should slow EWM growth, which will be an advantage to native species during the upcoming growing season.

We have been fortunate the last several years to have the weather on our side, making our efforts to control EWM that much easier. The way we conduct our treatments in years like this allows the native species to fill in and actually crowd out EWM.

In 2013 we treated 55 acres using liquid 2,4-d. The treatments and our plan continue to be very effective, and we will work the same plan again. Buddy Divers will do a full lake survey starting around Memorial Day, and Lake Restoration will conduct a treatment at the end of June. They will survey again around Labor Day and do treatments in the first part of October.

Last year everyone received an authorization form to sign allowing us to chemically treat along their shore if needed. The signatures are good for five years, so if you have not signed an authorization form, please do. The form is available on the Bay Lake website. Without your

Later this summer we will be asking you to inspect your shoreline for EWM and zebra mussels and to report back. Returning the post card with your observations and comments has been very helpful in the past, and I expect it will be again this season.

We have a very supportive community that really cares and has always been willing to support our efforts to keep Bay Lake the way we all remember. Please continue to give to the Environmental Protection Fund, which supports not only the EWM effort, but also the public access monitoring program run by Phil and Jane Rollins. They have really worked hard to get a great volunteer and paid inspection program in place.

We have to remember that these issues will continue, and there are or will be other threats to Bay

Lake. We have to be vigilant with our plans and programs. We are fortunate to have a very supportive community and an excellent lake association. The BLIA is organized to handle whatever comes our way. Your continued contributions are what is helping your lake association do what it is doing for all at Bay Lake.


8th Annual Golf Scramble and Picnic Aug. 9

Bay Lakers to celebrate 30 years of Runtilla fun

When Runtilla runners dashed forward to the crack of the starting gun in 1985, who knew that the event would be as popular as ever 30 years later?

This year Bay Lakers will gather as always near White Hawk on Aug. 2 to mark the 30th anniversary of the Bay Lake Runtilla. Runners, walkers, bikers and skaters of all ages — and a few canine participants — will travel the 5K course.

The event has seen a few changes. In 2009 road work on Hwy. 10 forced participants to stay on Brighton Point Road. The new route proved to be prettier and safer, and so popular, that it became the new tradition. The same year another tradition was born: a picnic after the awards ceremony, where participants and those that cheer them on celebrate their accomplishment over good food and conversation.

What hasn't changed is the enthusiasm of Bay Lakers for the event. Hundreds turn out, even on the few event days that have seen some rain.

As usual, this year registration will begin at 8:15 a.m., and the starting gun will sound at 9. Participants will go 1.55 miles down Brighton Point Road to a marker and return. The top three male and female runners in each of nine age-group categories will receive awards.

Following the awards ceremony, Bay Lakers will enjoy the now traditional picnic, with good food and a few

surprises to celebrate the event's 30-year milestone.
