Still no zebra mussels in sight in Bay Lake

This past summer, Bay Lake continued its aggressive program of using paid DNR-trained inspectors to examine boats coming and going via our public access. Beginning mid-May and ending late October, inspectors were present every day for most daylight hours, roughly 6 a.m. to 8 p.m., with some longer shifts on holidays and weekends.

Good news that, through mid-October, we have no sign that zebra mussels (ZMs) or any other aquatic invasive species (AIS) are in the lake.

new ZM infestations. When an infestation is first discovered and if it can be contained in a small area, DNR has the ability to treat and attempt to exterminate the ZMs. However, if the ZMs are widespread, current resources and technologies don't allow for an extermination program. Therefore, early detection has become an important part of our efforts on Bay Lake.

In a new effort to catch a possible infestation early, last season we installed and frequently checked 11 ZM

detectors around the lake. We also conducted mid-summer water testing for microscopic ZM larvae (known as veligers) and periodically hired a scuba diver to search for ZMs near the public access.

Bay Lakers can help by examining their own dock poles and boat lift supports, both during the summer and as docks and lifts are removed for winter. In some lakes, children, who tend to be in the water more often than adults, have found AIS, continued on Page 3

Weather conditions make 2015 a challenging year for Eurasian watermilfoil and native weed control

After several years of relatively minimal Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) issues, this year was a little more challenging.

When there was very little snow cover this past winter, we knew there were going to be issues with all the weeds in the lake. While the EWM was worse than it had been in a number of years, the native species were as big of a problem. They also were growing under the ice last winter and came on with a vengeance this spring along with the EWM.

ZMs. You can help by making your young people aware of this important role they can play.

Another new threat

Up to this point, we've focused primarily on ZMs and the spiny water flea, both in Mille Lacs and other nearby waters. A new invasive specie plant, starry stonewort, has found its way into several Minnesota lakes, although none nearby. Try an Internet search for this plant to learn how much more destructive the stonewort is than Eurasian watermilfoil or ZMs. Yes, fighting the AIS battle does seem unending.

After our Fall survey, we treated a total of 85 acres (88 sites) the first week of October. This was in addition to the previous treatment of eight acres in June. Fall treatments have been very effective in the past, and with great weather conditions, I would expect good results again.

We appreciate all those who responded with a post card after checking your shoreline for EWM and zebra mussels. Once again, those findings are very helpful in the survey process.

Next year we will continue our plan of controlling EWM in Bay Lake. We appreciate the incredible support from everyone around the lake.
