Bay Lake's AIS prevention, detection program grows

Bay Lake's AIS (aquatic invasive species) prevention program becomes more complicated each year. Our 2015 plan has several new components, including additional testing and development of a rapid response plan should we become infested with new invasive species. Here's a rundown for this summer.



Public Access Inspection Program

We will again pay for DNR (Department of Natural Resources)-trained inspectors on the public access ramp during daylight hours, seven days a week. The program started on May 1 and will continue until at least the end of September. The state provides some funding, but less than in 2014. Even with the state support, the BLIA has budgeted to spend up to \$27,000 for inspectors.

DNR schedules one of their portable decontamination units on our access, as often as twice a month. In addition, the county has purchased two decon units, one of which will be stationed nearby on Farm Island Lake.

About eight years ago, we purchased the iLids camera device, which records every launch and retrieval on our access. It also vocally alerts

boaters to follow DNR AIS regulations. If you use the public access, you will see (and should hear) the silver steel iLids canister to the left of the ramp near the water.

Testing and Detection

This summer, we will continue a program to help us better understand the chemical makeup of the lake and how hospitable it would be to new invasive species such as zebra mussels. As part of this effort, the county is implementing a new lake testing program. We will mail water samples to a lab for evaluation. Results will help us develop an AIS rapid response plan, to be used if we find new invasives in our waters.

Late last year we installed six zebra mussel detection devices, small wooden structures that hang in the water from the ends

of docks. We will expand this program in 2015, hanging as many as 10 devices at different points around the lake.

Each year, additional Crow Wing County lakes become infested with zebra mussels. This year, the state has committed about \$10 million to an AIS program, with the county receiving about \$400,000. Those funds are helping many county lakes with new inspection programs. Due to these new programs, our county support has decreased. However, due to the generosity of so many Bay Lakers, our reserves are strong, giving us the financial resources to pay for the various AIS activities. We are blessed with a great community, thanks to all of you who support it.

Little snow, lots of winter sun, low water, early ice-out may bring heavy EWM this summer; our strong program should help control it

Welcome to another season at Bay Lake. We will continue our efforts to control EWM (Eurasian watermilfoil) in Bay Lake as we have in the past. We will have a spring EWM lake-wide survey followed by chemical treatments in mid to late June.

The EWM has been very stable the last few seasons due to heavy snow cover, high water, cool temperatures, wetter than normal precipitation and less sunshine. Because we are able to keep the EWM to a minimum with our management program during these conditions, native species actually help keep the EWM in check and are more dominant than the EWM.

Well...as I have said before, the weather goes in cycles, and this season it looks like we will see conditions more favorable for EWM growth. This past winter there was virtually no snow cover, a high amount of sunshine during the winter and now in the spring, low water and early ice-out. All these conditions have shown us several times that there could be explosive EWM growth this summer.

The good news is that because we have a program in place to control EWM, we will keep working our plan, and I am certain we will manage our way through this cycle as we have before. I fully expect to see more acreage requiring treatment this fall than in recent years. We have changed our treatments to use Liquid 2,4-d with improved application equipment that is more accurate and effective at a lower cost.

Our program does work, and we will work our way through this weather cycle as in the past. Without our Environmental Protection Fund and the BLIA Aquatic Invasive Species programs, we would be in

trouble. Your donations all these years have made this work, so please keep giving to the Environmental Protection Fund.

Lake phosphorus levels down from 2012, chlorides rising slowly; we can help keep water quality good

Spring has arrived at Bay Lake, so this is a good time to update BLIA members on some water quality issues.

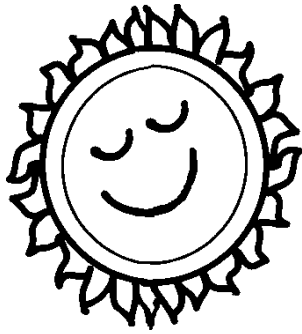
First, some cabin owners are unfortunately returning to find their lakeshore was damaged by ice ridges over the winter. Crow Wing County Land Services (CWCLS) recently issued guidance that allows ice ridges to be re-graded back to original elevation without a permit *provided* the work is done in the same calendar year the ice ridge was created. Repair of historic ice ridge damage that occurred over two or more years requires a shoreland alteration permit. Other rules can also apply, so contact CWCLS directly at (218) 824-1125 or environmental.services@crowwing.us to inquire about your own situation before starting work.

On a more positive note, we conducted water quality sampling through the ice in February 2015 as we do every few years to allow trending over time. Total Phosphorus (TP) levels are an indicator we watch closely because it is a direct measure of nutrient levels in the lake. Excess amounts of TP act like fertilizer in the lake and can lead to decreased water clarity, algae blooms in the summer and accelerated weed growth. February 2015 TP levels had dropped nearly 62 percent compared to 2012. This is really, really good news, and while a single good year does not indicate a trend, it does suggest that the efforts of the Bay Lake Improvement Association and property owners to reduce nutrient inflows to the lake are having the desired effect.

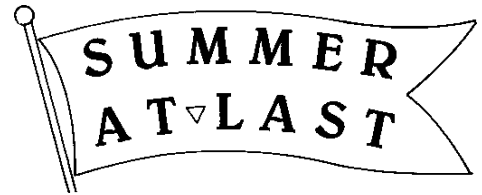
This good news on TP was somewhat tempered by results that indicate slowly increasing levels of chlorides in the lake. Chloride levels are safe, but are well above the normal range for lakes in our area. The most likely sources of chlorides are winter deicing chemicals used on roads, driveways and sidewalks, and the regeneration of water softeners that discharge into leaking septic systems. We'll be following up with the highway department to see what they can do to minimize runoff from deicing, but we should all be mindful of things we can do to help as well.

We plan to continue our annual summer monitoring program that focuses on water clarity and will report the results of that work in the fall. Thank you for your support of BLIA and for your own ongoing efforts as landowners to help keep our lake clean.

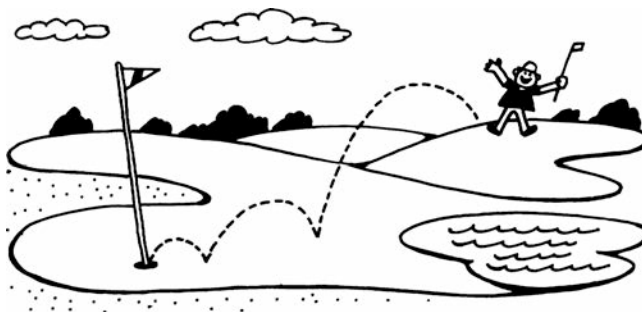

31st annual Runtilla to happen August 1

In what has become a longtime Bay Lake tradition, Bay Lakers of all ages will gather near White Hawk on Aug. 1 for the 31st annual Bay Lake Runtilla.

Many will run, walk, bike or skate the 5K course while family, friends and other Bay Lakers cheer them on.

With registration beginning at 8:15 a.m., the starting gun will sound at 9. Participants will go 1.55 miles down Brighton Point Road to a marker and return. Awards will go to the top male and female runners in each of nine age-group categories.

The Brighton Point Road route is a comparatively new tradition, starting in 2009 when road work forced runners off Hwy. 10. The new route proved safer and prettier, and so popular that it became the new tradition.

Now participants still on the first leg of the run can see race leaders as they head back toward the finish line, and Brighton Point Road residents get to watch the action without leaving home.

“It’s all contained in a pretty area,” said Jim Bye, Runtilla founder and coordinator. “People sit in chairs with picnic tables in their driveways and watch the race.”

After the awards ceremony Bay Lakers will again enjoy a picnic, with Dennis “Charlie” and Jackie Charles hosting the fun.

Bay Lakers age 20 and under and 70 and over are invited to submit a drawing for the front of the Runtilla t-shirt. The shirt will also carry names of Runtilla sponsors. A \$50 donation will earn a mention on the back of the shirt, \$250 will secure space on a sleeve, and \$1,000 or more will
