

## Still working to keep zebra mussels out of Bay Lake

Beginning in 2015, the State of Minnesota committed \$10 million annually to local counties to support their prevention and education efforts about invasive species. With this funding Crow Wing County expanded its key program and provided trained AIS (aquatic invasive species) inspectors on the many “at risk” lakes and waterways.

For 2017, Crow Wing County will monitor about 50 bodies of water. While we applaud the county’s expanded effort, protection for so many has spread the county resources thin.

Generous Bay Lakers continue to help pay for inspectors on our access ramp all season long. It is a luxury many lakes do not enjoy.



This year, our challenge is not funding but finding inspectors. The county projects a shortfall of summer workers who can be hired and trained.

Just as we have in the recent past, we requested daily coverage from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. mid-May through late September. Our request has not been confirmed, and given the number of lakes

now in the county program and the projected personnel shortage, I am not hopeful that we’ll get what we’ve asked for. We may have to rely on our own DNR-trained AIS volunteers, as we have in the past. Stay tuned.

All Bay Lakers: **Please remember to drain, clean and dry any watercraft coming into or leaving Bay Lake and insist your guests do the same.** As reported last fall, no evidence of zebra mussels had been found in Bay Lake, and we’re working hard to keep it that way.

Additional information about our ramp monitoring program will come through BLIA e-mail blasts and on the website.

### Give “new-to-you” equipment a 3-week dry period

Twenty-one (21) days. That’s the minimum number of days the DNR (Department of Natural Resources) requires boat lifts, docks, swim rafts and associated equipment be kept out of the water after moving from one lake to another. This “dry time” will destroy any invasive species hiding in nooks and crannies, especially on boat lifts.

Rumors are flying that a number of new lake service providers are operating in the Bay Lake area and that all may not be licensed or trained by the DNR. If you work with someone new to Bay Lake or are buying equipment that has been used in another lake, please insist that it be left to dry for at least 21 days. And if you observe any of this equipment heading for Bay Lake,

please ask the operator if it has been out of water for the required 21 days. Finally, feel free to report any suspicious activity to the DNR in St. Paul (651) 259-5706 or to me.

# Water quality sampling shows concerns; you can help

The Bay Lake Improvement Association (BLIA) typically performs monthly water quality sampling during the summer (May-September) each year, and does a single round of winter sampling every other year. Summer sampling provides information on water quality during the times when the lake is in heavy use and is susceptible to sudden changes in water quality from short-term events such as extreme weather. Winter sampling is performed when the lake is iced-over and stable, which provides the best indicator of long-term trends by eliminating the influence of short-term weather events. All sampling is conducted by our consultant, AWRL, with assistance from BLIA volunteers to reduce the cost.

2017 was a winter sampling year, so in February water samples were collected through the ice at various depths at four designated locations around the lake. We just received the data report, and the results are not as good as we would like.

Total Phosphorus (TP) had increased significantly in 2017, almost 39 percent above the previous high year (2012), and a whopping 268 percent (that's right, more than two and a half times!) over 2015 levels. The reasons for this jump are not clear. Phosphorus levels can be influenced by natural factors such as seasonal rainfall and changes in lake water pH, as well as shoreline and watershed land management practices.

As you've heard us say before, high TP is a concern because it leads to more aquatic plant growth, and when that plant growth dies and decomposes it can

lead to low oxygen levels harmful to fish. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) identified the following things cabin owners can do to reduce phosphorus loading to lakes:

- Shop for low- or non-phosphorus dishwashing liquids and soaps, and use only non-phosphorus laundry detergent.
- Wash boats and cars on the lawn to prevent soap and rinse water from running into lake.
- Collect organic material (leaves, grass clippings, etc.) from shoreline, street drains and gutters to keep out of the lake.
- Use only phosphorus-free lawn fertilizer, and use mulching mowers to chop up grass clippings and leave them on the lawn to reduce the need for fertilizer.
- Restore natural shoreline habitat to prevent phosphorus-laden runoff from entering the lake.

The 2017 winter sampling data also indicated that chloride levels had increased 10 percent from 2012. Chlorides are entirely a man-made pollutant attributed mostly to road and driveway/sidewalk salt. association board about possible outreach to the county and township road maintenance departments before next winter to make sure local government is aware of this concern.

We will be keeping a close eye on future water quality sampling results to see if these trends continue.

## EWM control

We continue our plan to control EWM (Eurasian watermilfoil) in Bay Lake. Last year we treated approximately 51 acres, 11 in the spring and 40 in the fall. This spring we will start with a survey of the lake around Memorial Day and will treat necessary areas in the third or fourth week of June, weather depending. We will repeat the process around Labor Day, chemically treating sites approximately Oct. 1.

This year we will not be collecting signatures authorizing treatments along your shore. Rather, we will assume everyone approves unless we are notified that you do not approve of BLIA chemically treating with liquid 2,4-D within 150 ft. of your shoreline if needed.

To opt out, please call, e-mail or write me and say so, describing your property by address, fire number (if you know it), photo from the water and/or neighbors on either side of you, so we can properly identify your property.

We will notify everyone of treatment times as soon as we can with a Bay Lake Blast e-mail and a website post.

**You do not need to send anything saying you approve of treatments.**

Word has it that we may be in for a big tick season. With warmer winter weather, fewer ticks have been killed by cold temperatures. Most people know that a bite from a tiny deer tick can transmit Lyme Disease. But a rare and more troublesome disease, Powassan, is also possible.

To prevent tick bites, avoid high brushy areas, wear long sleeves and pants, use insect repellent with DEET or picaridin or IR3535, and do tick checks after being outdoors. Ticks are most active in late spring, early summer and mid-fall. Have a safe, tick-free summer!
