Zebra mussels found in Bay Lake this summer; goal now to contain them, keep out other invasives

For more than 20 years, your association has been working to prevent the introduction of new invasive species, like zebra mussels (ZMs). As we reported over the summer, three mature ZMs were found at different locations: east of the Church Island channel, just north of Malkerson Island and near the public access. July DNR (Department of Natural Resources) water sampling showed microscopic ZM veligers (larvae) in the water column. Scuba diving, dock and lift inspections, and additional water sampling found no other evidence of an infestation, thus we were unable to find a specific site of multiple specimens.

Bay is surrounded by lakes with ZM invasions. In 2012, ZMs were found in nearby Pelican Lake, and their population increases were closely monitored each year. Testing there has shown fewer than one ZM per square foot observed in 2012-14, then 12 per square foot in 2015 and 300 in 2016, after which the numbers leveled off. And while Bay Lake water mineral and chemical makeup are suitable for ZM expansion, our lack of a rocky bottom may slow down the expansion. My guess is that we will have two to three years of minimal ZM population growth, followed by a large increase.

The University of Minnesota Aquatic Species Research Center continues to study methods of treating and eliminating ZMs and other invasives. Treatments of small infestations have shown mixed results and lakewide treatment is not yet available. We are following closely work done at the Center. The BLIA Board has approved a donation to support their work (see below) and is encouraging individuals to do the same. New and more damaging invasives are finding their way into some Midwest lakes. To minimize our risk, we will continue our public access boat inspection program to try to prevent any new infestations.

As anyone on Pelican, Mille Lacs, Gull or other infested lakes will tell you, living with ZMs is a hassle, but does not spoil life on the lake. As we progress through this situation, we will continue to communicate with BLIA members about what to expect and new developments in ZM management and eradication.

At its September meeting, your BLIA Board approved the donation of \$10,000 to the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center, based on the University of Minnesota campus. The donation will be applied specifically to the area of zebra mussel management and control research and represents less than 1.5 percent of our current reserves. MAISRC funding comes from various sources: the DNR, state legislature and 45 other lake associations. Eurasian watermilfoil still under control

This year we continued our program to control Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake as we have since 1992. We conducted a spring survey and then treated 20 acres of EWM in June. We did a survey again around Labor Day, followed by a treatment of 30 acres the first week of October.

The treatments last fall and again this June were very effective. Once again this summer the native vegetation was very healthy and diverse, keeping the EWM in check. Over all, EWM was significantly reduced in area and density from previous years. Fall treatments work the best, with spring/summer treatments having had mixed results over the years. For the most part, we treat potential traffic and access areas in the spring and larger/more sites in the fall. Our goal has always been to not let EWM be the dominant plant in the lake, and we have done just that.

We sent out EWM and zebra mussel ID cards in August asking all who can to inspect their shoreline, docks and boats for signs of zebra mussels or EWM, and the response was very helpful and appreciated. Thanks to all who returned the postcards with your findings.

As a reminder, we are not collecting treatment authorization



signatures any longer. We are working on the assumption that it is OK to treat your shoreline unless we hear from you that it is not. Each year we will survey the lake in late May/early June, conducting a treatment in June. We will then do another survey around Labor Day, followed up with a treatment in the first part of October. This will be posted in the spring and fall issues of the Breezes each year and on the Bay Lake website approximately a week before each treatment. We will also send an e-mail notification to everyone on our list before each treatment.

Thanks to all for your support. We continue to control EWM in Bay Lake, and it's because of all of your contributions and support for the program.

BLIA to focus on water quality in 2019

2020 will mark the 50th anniversary of the Bay Lake Improvement Association. A small committee has been meeting to decide how to celebrate the successes of those 50 years, with announcements coming in the spring.
