Goals: Keep new invasive species out of Bay Lake, control those already here

This year, our aquatic invasive species (AIS) focus will be to better understand the factors that affect the quality of Bay Lake waters.

We will look to:

- Enhance and protect our shorelines,
- Prevent new invasive species from entering the lake,
- Control the invasives we already have.
- Decrease phosphorous levels,
- Continue testing for Zebra Mussel (ZM) infestation.

Last summer (2018), we found three mature ZM specimens, and the DNR (Department of Natural Resources) discovered microscopic veligers (larvae). However, further exploration failed to find any other signs. We will continue frequent periodic testing and searches during the 2019 season, but our best resource for finding an infestation is YOU. Bay Lakers in, on and around the lake are the ones most likely to find the small ZM shells (the size of your pinky fingernail).

In June, we will meet with the Crow Wing County Soil and Water District. These lake shoreline experts can help us better understand how and where runoff into the lake occurs and how we might mitigate the inflow of harmful chemicals, especially phosphorous.

In 2018, we provided financial support to the University of Minnesota AIS Research Center (MAISRC). Scientists there are investigating possible methods of controlling and eliminating invasives. Many other lake associations support the center, as does the state. We believe the work at MAISRC offers one of the best opportunities for finding solutions to meet current AIS infestations and to prevent others in the future.

Unfortunately, a handful of more serious invasives are working their way through Minnesota lakes.

We continue to partner with Crow Wing County to provide paid inspectors during daylight on our public access. Inspections started May 10 and continue through mid-September.

A small troupe of Bay Lake volunteers fill in when paid inspectors are not available, but we need more. If you are interested in helping out, contact Sandy Johnson, 612-396-4076 or sanderooj@msn.com.

Successful EWM control continues

We are conducting our annual Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) survey now and will follow up with any required treatments in the second or third week of June

Property owner advanced approval is no longer needed to treat along shorelines. However, if you do not want your shoreline treated for EWM, you need to notify the Bay Lake Improvement

We will conduct another survey in September, with treatments around the first week in October, weather permitting.

Share your long-ago Bay Lake memories


We all have fond memories of our time at Bay Lake, even as we continue to make more.

Join in the fun of the 35th annual Runtilla, Saturday, Aug. 3

With friends and family members cheering them on, Bay Lakers of all ages will line up Aug. 3 to run, walk, bike and skate down Brighton Point Road and back for the 35th annual Runtilla.

Registration for the 5K (3.1 mile) run begins at 8:15 a.m., and the starting gun will sound at 9. As always, the fastest male and female runners in each age group will win awards. This year two new age group categories will recognize older runners/walkers in response to the high number of active seniors participating in recent years. Last year a Runtilla participant who was over 90 years old completed the course. The traditional 71-plus age category will become ages 71-77, 78-84 and 85-plus.

Josh Goolsbee and the Lonesome Pine team will be there with their Bloody Mary bar. Following the awards ceremony, everyone is invited to stick around to enjoy the traditional picnic, compliments of hosts Dennis "Charlie" and Jackie Charles.

Bay Lakers age 20 and under, and 70 and older, are invited to submit an original design for the front of the Runtilla t-shirt. The winning artist's name will appear on the shirt with the design.

Bay Lake Camp forming supportive, member-based association; you can join


