Bay Lake water quality good; let's keep it that way

The Bay Lake Improvement Association contracts with A. W. Research Laboratories to conduct monthly Trophic Status Index (TSI) monitoring each year. Sampling is conducted monthly from May through September at four established locations distributed around the lake.

TSI is a widely recognized scoring system used to assess the health of a lake by looking at factors such as water clarity, dissolved oxygen (essential to support healthy fish populations), chlorophyll and phosphorus (a nutrient essential for aquatic plant and algae growth).

What constitutes "normal" TSI values varies significantly by ecoregion across the state. For example, northern lakes tend to be clear and cold with higher dissolved oxygen levels and low phosphorus and chlorophyll levels. This results in appealing water quality for recreation with healthy and diverse fish populations. Southern lakes in the state tend to be warmer and

usually have lower dissolved oxygen and higher nutrient levels, resulting in more weeds, greener water with frequent algae blooms and limited fish species. Improper land use and development can cause otherwise healthy northern lakes to take on the undesired characteristics of a southern lake and can make southern lakes worse to the point of being totally unsuitable for fishing or recreation.

Monitoring data collected over the past several years and in 2020 indicate that Bay Lake has very good water quality overall. Compared to other lakes within the Northern Lakes and Forest Ecoregion of Minnesota, Bay Lake ranks among the best for the parameters measured. This is great news for all of us and is a result of the good work of all Bay Lakers who manage their lakeshore in a way that protects the lake.

The key to maintaining or hopefully even improving water quality in the future is to keep chemicals and nutrients from getting into the lake, especially from runoff. Please continue good land management practices such as avoiding the use of fertilizers, planting and maintaining buffer zones along your lakeshore, maintaining septic systems and making an effort to keep fall leaves and summer grass clippings out of the lake.

For those of you interested in learning more about this topic, I encourage you to look at the Minnesota DNR's "Score Your Shore" website. Information provided there provides ideas that might be beneficial on your own property. By paying attention to these best-practices we can ensure Bay Lake continues to be a treasure for future generations.

Successful EWM control program will continue

We will continue our Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) control program again this spring. This will be our 30th season successfully controlling EWM in Bay Lake. We will conduct a survey of the lake around Memorial Day, followed by a treatment of EWM approximately the third week of June. We will repeat this process in the fall starting around Labor Day, followed by treatment the first week of October.

As a reminder, we are not required to collect authorization signatures from individual

property owners to treat shorelines. We are working by exception. If someone does not want chemical treatments along their shoreline, they need to contact us and let us know. We will send an e-mail blast notification to all about a week before we treat in June and again in September. If you don't want treatments along your shoreline or have questions, you can contact me anytime. Treatment notification will also be posted on the Bay Lake website at the same time.

We can't let our guard down. Following our same plan over the years has worked, so we will keep at it. Our goal from the beginning was to not allow EWM to dominate the lake, realizing that native vegetation was critical to the health of the lake, and it has worked very well; the native plants are healthy and diverse.

This program has been successful because of your support! When EWM was first found in Bay Lake it was the issue of the day for area lakes

Renovations at Ruttger's Resort

The Ruttger family welcomes new owners 1898 Management to Ruttger's and they have some updates to share.

The golf shop interior has been completely remodeled and Zig's is now the White Oak Grill. The new bar and counter tops are made from white oaks that came down in the June 19, 2016, storm. There are new menus at the White Oak Grill, Ruby's Dining Room and the Bear Pine Bar. Ruby's and the fireplace lobby also have their original wood floors restored. Remodeling projects have started in the Bay Lake Villas and North Bay units and will be completed this spring.

Majority of the construction will start this fall after
Oktoberfest. Projects include a new restaurant on the lake, as well as larger lakeside cottages that will replace many of the smaller cabins. Renovations to the lodge will bring the checkin area to the lake, new lobby and reception space will put the

historic lodge and dining room at the center of the facility. The indoor pool will be moved to a new location, while the meeting and events space will be refreshed as well. The Bear Pine Bar will be rebuilt for better flow and comfort. A new outdoor pool will be constructed on the site of the existing one, with enhanced seating and gathering areas.

Lastly, this year Ruttger's has increased its marina rental inventory to include a couple of new pontoons, a tri-toon and new jet skis. All motorized marina rentals will be available to the public with half-day and full-day rates.

As a result of these projects, Bay Lake will benefit from a new stormwater runoff plan and elimination of net 5,000 square feet of structures in the shore impact zone.

Thank you to the Bay Lake Improvement Association for its continued support throughout the years. We hope to see you at the resort this summer!

Ruttger's Bay Lake Resort

Maintaining a healthy lake and community

From aquatic invasive species (AIS) to organizational finances and more, the Bay Lake Improvement Association Board members and other volunteers continue to work toward maintaining a healthy lake and community. Here are some things we're working on — and you have and can continue to help.

Zebra Mussels. If you've been reading our messages in recent years, you know we have a zebra mussel infestation on our hands. Last fall, many, including me, found the small mussels on equipment as it was hauled from the lake. Over the past 10-plus years, the mussels have found their way into approximately 150 Minnesota lakes, with more undoubtedly to come. Much invasive species control, management and eradication research is being conducted at the U of M-based Minnesota AIS Research Center, an organization we support financially. At our urging, the center has developed important and useful information about what the zebra mussel infestation means for lakeshore owners, which has been mailed to all BLIA members and is available at www.baylake.org.

Spiny Water Fleas. This tiny pest has infested Mille Lacs and is threatening Bay Lake. County AIS inspectors will again monitor boats coming into (and leaving) Bay all summer, but please encourage your guests, friends and neighbors to clean and dry all boats and equipment before entering Bay.


BLIA Finances. Although donations were down last year, many members did make contributions and we were able to manage net income of \$9,000-plus, amazing in the COVID year. The many such donations in the past, and significant contributions made by the Runtilla for the last 37 years, have created a very healthy reserve. Thanks to the many who were able to make donations last year.

BLIA Insurance. In 2020, we undertook a comprehensive look at our Directors and Officers coverage and general liability. After months of research, meetings and phone calls, new policies were procured and we now have better protection for about the same premiums.

N. MN Land Trust (affiliated with the MN Land Trust)

In February, trust officials contacted BLIA about partnering to try to protect large land parcels in our watershed from development. We expect to be working with them over the summer, identifying and meeting with qualifying parcel owners.
