Working to keep new invasives out of Bay Lake

We are expecting another summer of strong efforts to continue reducing the risks of new invasives finding their way into Bay Lake. Here's a quick summary of our current situation and what we'll be doing this coming season.

Zebra Mussels (ZMs) will continue to make their presence known. Water quality should again be clear, as the ZMs are filter feeders and filter as much as one liter of water per day. Based on ZM growth in other lakes, we should reach maximum expansion of ZMs this summer or in 2024, as their population reaches the point where the lake environment should not support continued buildup.

We will continue partnering with the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) on a pilot project to learn more about how the mussels proliferate. In June, 20 ZM detectors, consisting of two or three stacked plates, will be hung off docks in locations around the lake and retrieved in September. We are looking for volunteers to help with this project. Contact me if you are interested.

BLIA provides financial support to MAISRC, joining many other lake associations.

Spiny Water Flea. These pests clog eyelets of fishing rods and can prevent fish from being landed. They prey on native zooplankton, which are an important food source for native fishes. We will sample the lake twice over the summer.

Starry Stonewart. This algae grows densely, covering sediment and forming mounds of vegetation up to six feet tall. It can outcompete other aquatic plants, harming habitat for fish and other wildlife by reducing cover and food sources. It also impacts ecosystems by absorbing

phosphorous and changing the chemistry of sediment. Few lakes report finding starry, and we have not seen it in Bay. If caught early, it's possible to remove it before it becomes embedded in a lake. Several BLIA members are trained to identify starry and we're looking for others to join the team.

Public Access. Working with Crow Wing County, we will again have DNR-trained inspectors checking boats on our public access from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily, mid-May through mid-September. Inspectors are trained to detect invasives on incoming boats and to make sure boats leaving

Bay do not contain ZMs or milfoil that could be transferred to other lakes. The county pays for about half the cost, with BLIA covering the rest.

Periodically, you may see a DNR inspector and boat decontamination unit on our access.

These activities and the treatment of Eurasian watermilfoil consume a big part of our annual budget. Thanks to those who donate to the Environmental Protection Fund, which supports these programs.

Successful EWM control continues

We will continue our Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) control program again this spring. This will be our 32nd season successfully controlling EWM in Bay Lake. We will conduct a survey of the lake around Memorial Day, followed by a treatment of EWM approximately the third week of June. We will repeat this process in the fall starting around Labor Day, followed by treatment the first week of October.

As a reminder, we are not required to collect authorization signatures from individual property owners to treat shorelines. We are working by exception. If someone does not want chemical treatments along their shoreline, they need to contact us and let us know. We will send an email blast notification to all about a week before we treat in June and again in September. If you don't want treatments along

your shoreline or have questions, you can contact me anytime. Treatment notification will also be posted on the Bay Lake website at the same time.

Following our same plan over the years has worked, so we will keep at it. Our goal from the beginning was to not allow EWM to dominate the lake, realizing that native vegetation was critical to the health of the lake, and it has worked very well; the native plants are healthy and diverse.

In August there will be an email blast with aquatic invasive species information asking residents to inspect their shoreline for EWM, zebra mussels and starry stonewort, and report back with findings.

We have a busy summer planned with several external groups booked who are either returning from the previous year or new to Bay Lake. We continue to move forward with buildings and grounds projects. Fall of 2022 we started a two-to-three-year project of staining the main buildings. Swimmer's Itch Committee begins work to lessen problem on Bay Lake

The BLIA Swimmer's Itch Committee has met monthly since September 2022. Our primary focus has been obtaining a State of Minnesota DNR and US Fish and Wildlife Services permit for addressing the Swimmer's Itch problem on Bay Lake.

Unfortunately, Swimmer's Itch is not a topic on the DNR's list of serious lake problems. It's not considered something that needs their attention, unlike aquatic invasive species (AIS). Swimmer's Itch is considered a nuisance. Educating the MN DNR of the S.I. problem, our solution, the magnitude on Bay Lake as well as the severity of the problem to some Bay Lakers became our first task.

The S.I. Committee developed a survey with a few simple questions along with space for Bay Lakers to provide feedback on their experiences with S.I. Paul Erickson assisted our committee with the distribution to his master email list of Bay Lake Blast recipients. The results illustrate how widespread and important Swimmer's Itch is to Bay Lakers.

We received 232 responses. Here are the survey question results:

Have you, a family member or guest had Swimmer's Itch in the last year?

Yes -- 82.8%

Has Swimmer's Itch impacted your, a family member's or a guest's enjoyment of Bay Lake in the last year?

Yes -- 80.2%

Have you, a family member or guest sought medical attention due to Swimmer's Itch in the last year?

Yes -- 14.7%

Some of the comments we received mentioned how family members and guests avoided the water for several weeks. More than one respondent shared how their young children or grandkids are now afraid of the lake due to an experience with Swimmer's Itch on Bay Lake.

The survey also allowed for the creation of a GIS map based on lake address information supplied on the survey. The map indicates areas on Bay Lake where Swimmer's Itch has been encountered. With roughly 1/3 of the properties responding to the survey, the map clearly showed the widespread nature of the problem. The results of our survey, the map of the lake with cabin owners impacted by Swimmer's Itch along with scientific data have been provided to the State of Minnesota DNR.

Recently our service provider, Swimmer's Itch Solutions (S.I.S.), and the State of Minnesota Wildlife Research Manager in St. Paul discussed our permit application and the specific methods for addressing Swimmer's Itch on Bay Lake. We're awaiting word from the DNR on the next step in the process. (S.I.S. has a pending federal permit from the US Fish and Wildlife Services. We need to receive the State of Minnesota permit to tie to the US Fish and Wildlife Services permit.)

Our method for reducing the cases of Swimmer's Itch is also a new concept to the DNR. We are not applying any chemicals or treating the water in any way. Our method addresses the relationship between the common merganser and a specific snail, both found on Bay Lake. By live capture and relocation of common mergansers to Lake Superior, a suitable nesting ground that does not have the snail necessary for Swimmer's Itch, the symbiotic relationship is broken, and cases of Swimmer's Itch become less and less common. This method has worked in multiple lakes in Michigan and is approved at the federal level. Another benefit of the "capture and relocate" method is the reduction in the use of copper sulfate, an inorganic compound that accumulates on the lake bottom.

The Swimmer's Itch Committee remains optimistic a permit will be issued by the DNR this spring. However, we are committed to continuing our efforts in reducing Swimmer's Itch cases on Bay Lake in the event our permit is not issued in 2023.
