BLIA hires DNR to monitor public access for zebra mussels

Zebra mussels were discovered in the Brainerd lakes area last fall. The threat of zebra mussels is a very real one. There is no fix for zebra mussels (!) and it is not something we could try to manage like Eurasian watermilfoil.

Zebra mussels are most likely transported by boats. We have tried over the years to get people to volunteer to work as boat inspectors at the public access and have not been successful. The Bay Lake Improvement Association decided with this new and very real threat to contract with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for 450 hours of additional access monitoring at the primary public access to Bay Lake. This started in late May and will continue until Labor Day.

The DNR will run this program at a cost to the Association of approximately \$5,000. In the future, it would be in our best interest if we could get volunteers to be trained and to monitor this access on a regular schedule throughout the summer.

BLIA continues successful control of EWM

Once again we will continue our fight against Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake. We will do as we have since 1992. This is our 13th season addressing EWM in Bay Lake. Our program is working to control the weed from both becoming a total nuisance and destroying the native vegetation.

Last year was a tough one for EWM: We treated approximately 150 acres. We aggressively treated all sites, including several large matted areas. We will find out in the next few weeks how successful we were.



In 2003, the north end of the lake was particularly heavy with EWM, whereas the south end of the lake had greatly reduced EWM sites as a result of our past efforts. EWM is scattered in the

lake, and we are making every effort to keep moving treatment sites around the lake so we do not have any one area that gets too large or dense. EWM is not going to go away, but we can continue to manage it.

We ask you to pull EWM around your dock if it is a problem. You can mechanically pull and remove an area of up to 50 feet by 50 feet (2500 square feet) around your shoreline without a permit. The treatment equipment cannot get in and around all the docks and boats. I

There will be 10 different species to choose from, or you can choose to take six of one species.

saw several dock areas last season that, with a little effort by the homeowner, would not have been such a nuisance.

We need your signature cards returned ASAP if you have not done so on the form mailed to you. The form is also available on-line at www.baylake.org. This signature is now valid for three years. If we do not have a signature on file, we will not treat your shoreline should treatment be needed.


This year we will use divers and surface surveys from Buddy Diving Service and Lake Restoration Inc., as we have for several years. We are doing the surveys in late May and early June, with treatment planned for the third or fourth week in June. We will repeat this in September.
