Recent winter, summer weather conditions have helped control EWM growth; we are doing our part

We continue to control Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake—this will be our 18th season doing so. After two average or above snowfall winters and higher water levels, combined with normal summer weather last year, we have had some much needed relief from the previous three years of heat, drought and explosive EWM growth.

Good snow cover is important because it blocks the light and prevents uncontrolled EWM growth under the ice. With our very successful treatments in the fall of 2007, combined with good, constant snow cover that winter, little growth happened during the winter of 2007-2008. 2008's average summer weather also helped out, giving the native vegetation a chance to fill in and it did in many areas. The EWM in 2008 was not nearly as dense nor as widespread as in 2007. With that being said, we only treated about 120 acres in 2008 vs. 200 in 2007.

The 2009 plan

This year we are surveying the lake as we have all these years starting around Memorial Day. We will treat in late June, then repeat the process in late summer and follow up with a fall treatment late in September.

After some very bad and expensive years in 2006 and 2007, last summer we were able to stay within budget at approximately \$125,000. I can't thank all of you enough in that we had the funds and the plan to carry us through. We will continue to aggressively fight this invasive species in Bay Lake.

Even though we have had a break the last year or two, we can't let up on our program. We have talked about these swings in conditions in the past, and we have to expect and be prepared for them in the future. It became very clear the last couple of years just how important it is that we aggressively fight EWM. Please continue contributing to BLIA and the Environmental Protection Fund. There really is no one to help us with these problems but us.

Authorization signatures are required for all onshore treatments. We did get most last year, but still need some. Either I or your beach captain will be working over the next six weeks to collect signatures we don't

have. If you have not authorized treatment along your shore, we will not be able to chemically treat it. There is a copy of the signature form with mailing or faxing instructions on the BLIA website for those who have not signed

card and a return postcard later this summer asking for your help in inspecting your shoreline for signs of EWM. This has been a very big help in years past, and I would ask for your support again.

We can and will continue to control EWM in Bay Lake. Our program does work. Your support and involvement is very much appreciated, and what our community has done in supporting these efforts is amazing. Please continue to give to the Environmental Protection Fund so we all can continue to use and enjoy Bay Lake as we have.

BLIA receives DNR grant for public access inspectors

The Bay Lake Improvement Association was awarded a \$2,000 grant from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to use toward the costs of hiring DNR-trained lake public access inspectors. This grant will help us provide additional DNR inspectors to supplement the inspection hours we now purchase from the DNR, and the hours donated by the volunteers from the Bay Lake community and the Deerwood Lion's Club.

These DNR inspection hours will be coordinated by Sylvia Graff, who also schedules the many volunteers who generously donate their time and talents to this important effort.

Inspection of watercraft entering and leaving Bay Lake at the public access is needed to help prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species. The public access inspectors encourage and assist boaters in removing aquatic plants from boats and trailers, and draining any live wells, bait buckets or other containers that may hold lake water. They are an important and helpful resource for boaters and others launching and removing watercraft from Bay Lake.

Watercraft inspections are particularly important to prevent the introduction of zebra mussels into Bay Lake from neighboring lakes. The prolific and harmful little mollucks have gained a strong foothold in Lake Mille Lacs and other neighboring waterbodies. Zebra mussel larve,

called veligers, can be the size of the period at the end of this sentence. They can be transported in virtually any amount of water. When they grow into adults, their sharp, hard shells can clog marine equipment and smother beaches. There is no effective treatment. The grant was awarded through the Minnesota DNR Invasive Species Program. The additional inspection hours we will be able to purchase with this grant will help us provide some, but not all, of the public access inspection hours we need. Volunteer public access monitors needed for coming season

As of Dec. 31, members of the Bay Lake Improvement Association and Deerwood Lakes Lions and DNR representatives monitored Bay Lake for 604 hours during 2008. Monitors inspected 980 crafts from 97 lakes, 11 U.S. states (Wisconsin, Arizona, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, South Dakota, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Nebraska, Texas) and Canada.

Data from the DNR revealed that about 7 percent of boaters were not familiar with the invasive species Eurasian watermilfoil and 17 percent of boaters were not familiar with zebra mussels. These numbers illustrate that many boaters using Bay Lake are unaware of the problems associated with invasive species, although many are very aware.

Already we are down in hours monitored from this time last year, so please consider monitoring a couple of four-hour sessions during the season. The protection of our lake and the money saved your BLIA would be substantial.

I will set up another one-hour training session to be given by the DNR this season. Even if you do not plan on monitoring, please educate yourself and ask friends to attend.

To those who have monitored this year, THANK YOU, as well as to those assisting me, to Ruttger's for accommodating the DNR sessions, to the Deerwood Lakes Lions and to Rick Bale for writing a \$2,000 grant request to the DNR.

The Bay Lake History Project is in high gear. Active initiatives are underway on almost all of our shorelines. The projects on the eastern half of the lake will likely be completed this summer and the same could be true for the Birkeland, Scotland Shores, Eaglewood, Bay Lake Shores/Doty's Addition shorelines and, possibly, also for the Wild Bird Lane, Bluffside Road and Bayview shorelines.

Maybe your coordinator needs your help...or maybe your shoreline still needs a coordinator. Then please read the "History Project FAQ" section to learn more about this exceptionally rewarding project.

While you're looking at the website, please also review the Bay Lake "Points of Reference" map. As I've recruited volunteers I've been surprised that many residents don't know the names of our bays, points and shorelines. The map is "first stab." Don't hesitate to suggest changes.

I've come to realize that this project is as much about strengthening our community as it is about documenting history. Bay Lake is unique. It's a community. Our challenge is to strengthen it. The History Project brings people together and helps

us appreciate our heritage — both of which are cornerstones of a wonderful community.

In early May we had an "Oldtimer" Party/Reunion involving families that homesteaded Bay Lake and a number of former residents. Organizing the event has given me an opportunity to meet people who, almost immediately, tell me stories of their fondest memories. Their enthusiasm and the emotion in their voices tell me how important Bay Lake was to them...and, more important, remind me how fortunate I am to be a Bay Laker. Our efforts to learn about the past are, surprisingly, actually about the future — because what we pass on to the next generation should be far more than just a cabin on a lake.
