EWM light in 2009; could be more challenging in 2010

The Bay Lake Improvement Association continues to control Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake — this will be our 19th season.

Last year was a relatively light year for EWM, especially after a couple of cooler, wetter seasons. These seasons were preceded by winters with good snow cover, which slows EWM growth. This past winter had decent snow cover until late February.

What we can expect this season for EWM is anyone's guess. If you consider the early ice-out and sunny, dry weather in March and April, it might make for an interesting season for EWM growth.

The good news is that our plan has dealt with these ups and downs before, and successfully at that. EWM is not the dominant plant in Bay Lake, and last year the native weed re-population was impressive.

We will be surveying the lake as we have all these years around Memorial Day by doing surface and underwater surveys. We will chemically treat for EWM in late June and repeat this process starting around Labor Day.

Last year was not too bad as far as EWM goes. We stayed under the budget of \$125,000 and treated approximately 105 acres. Thanks to everyone in our community for their contributions. We would not be able to do this without you, and we all have made a difference by not bowing to the threat. As I said, it appears that this year could be a little more of a challenge because of the weather so far this spring. We know our program works and we will continue to aggressively go after it.


Your authorization needed

It's time to gather signatures for approval to chemically treat for EWM on your shoreline. We have to have the authorization of all lakeshore owners to treat within 150 feet of their property; without it we will not treat that area. If I am missing your signature, we can skip your property. If the lack of your

signature makes it difficult, treatment may be dropped altogether, which is not fair to your neighbors.

The response so far has been excellent, just as in the past. Please ask your neighbors if they've signed their authorization letters. There will be copies at Hansen's to sign and send to me or leave for me to

pick up. We will have one online that you can print, sign and send to me as well. These approvals will be good for 2010, 2011 and 2012.



We are continuing to monitor the public access in an effort to keep zebra mussels out of Bay Lake and EWM from leaving Bay Lake and infesting another lake. Please volunteer for the public access monitoring; it is critical in keeping zebra mussels out of Bay Lake.

In August we will be sending EWM and zebra mussels ID cards out asking you to inspect your shoreline and immediate area. Make sure you send the card in whether you found something or not. You may also take samples to Hansen's for me to look at to see if it is EWM.

I apologize if I can't get back to everyone about the status of the samples. I try but sometimes there are too many of them. Thanks for your support. **EWM**, cont. on Page 5

Public access monitoring to increase hours to 24-7 with Internet help — human help still needed

As of Dec. 31, 2009, Bay Lake was monitored for 598 1/4 hours by the Bay Lake Improvement Association, Deerwood Lions, DNR (Department of Natural Resources) and Bay Lake Camp.

Monitors inspected 1,151 motorized crafts from 94 lakes, 11 states (Florida, Illinois, Iowa, North Dakota, North Carolina, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Washington and Wisconsin) and Canada.

During its inspection process, the DNR found 64 boats out of 613 inspected, or more than 10 percent, had come to Bay Lake from a body of water in Minnesota known to be infested with zebra mussels. The majority of the watercrafts were coming from Mille Lacs Lake and the Mississippi River.

During the 2009-2010 year we explored the possibility of installing an I-LIDS (Internet Landing Installed Device Sensor) for environmental sentry protection. I-LIDS use an automated, voice-activated, video monitoring device that captures the boat license, condition of the bottom of boats and trailers, prelaunch clean-off activities and postlaunch clean-offs. Studies have shown a significant drop of attached vegetation and increased self-inspections when boats were observed on monitored video.

Due to the large increase of DNR interns being used on more Minnesota lakes, the rate increase to \$15.25 an hour including drive time, the three-day notice of their change with a minimum purchase of a 500-hour

block, monitoring hours to be determined and/or changed by the DNR and the possibility of losing future DNR hours, the BLIA Board voted to purchase an I-LIDS container for the public landing to increase our daily inspections to a 24-hour basis, as several other lakes have done. We are now in the process of meeting with the DNR for inspection and for them to tell us what is needed to obtain a permit for installation.

What I-LIDS means to Bay Lake

- 1. Continuous and additional monitoring hours as well as voice activation at the public landing.
- 2. An easier job placing our trained monitors at the public landing. However, there is still a need for additional BLIA members, Deerwood Lions and the Bay Lake Camp to monitor. (You can't beat in-person monitoring.) 3. Awareness of visiting boatowners that they are being monitored 24 hours a day for invasive species control.
- 4. Education and instruction for boaters on cleaning, using signage and audio.
- 5. Joining other Minnesota lakes, such as Gull and Minnetonka, in using I-LIDS.

I-LIDS are installed on a flush level ground plate to protect the unit from vehicle impacts and have a bulletproof video glass that includes date, time, location, vehicle ID, users and presence of weeds on the boat.

Installing I-LIDS has no bearing on the DNR/Sheriff patrol of Bay Lake waters.

More good news is that Phil and Jane Rollins have offered to help with the monitoring. So listen for their phone call as they help set up the Bay Lake hours.

Also, for volunteer monitors, there is a black locked mailbox in the wooden enclosure at the landing, where you can place your evaluation sheets each time before you leave the landing. This will save a lot of hassle in returning them to us at the end of the year.

Thank you to all who monitored last year — keep up the good work.



Golfers of all abilities are invited to enjoy an afternoon on the golf course with friends




ning about 4 p.m. After golf everyone is welcome to join in the Family Picnic at the golf

New Runtilla traditions continue

Put on your running shoes, grab your bike or warm up your cheering voice and head to the 26th annual Bay Lake Runtilla on Saturday, July 24. Skates and walking shoes are welcome, too.

Check-in begins at 8:15 a.m. near White Hawk, and the starting gun will sound at 9.

Last year the 25th annual event created a new route to avoid construction on Hwy. 10. The route was so popular that this year's event will take the same path. Participants will start at the traditional finish line and go 1.55 miles down Brighton Point Road to a marker and return. The route proved to be safer and prettier than the traditional route and added to the camaraderie, as participants farther back in line were able to greet race leaders who were on their return trip.

After the awards ceremony Bay Lakers are invited to stay for a cookout featuring BBQ hot dogs, brats and other goodies, compliments of sponsors Dennis "Charlie" Charles, longtime owner of the White Hawk, and the Lonesome Pine. The Lonesome Pine will also sponsor a band and enter a float in the race.

All proceeds go directly to the BLIA Environmental Protection Fund and BLIA's effort to maintain the lake's water quality.

Participant entry forms will be available at Hansen's beginning Memorial Day weekend.

Last year's Runtilla drew a record number of participants and others cheering them on. "Whether you walk, run, bike or watch, the most fun is to have people there," said Bye. "The event continues to be all about Bay Lake people enjoying Bay Lake."

Minnesota Breeding Bird Atlas project coming to Bay Lake

There now is a statewide survey, using volunteer citizen scientists, to document breeding birds. This will result in the Minnesota Breeding Bird Atlas and is a nonprofit bird conservation project.

Chase Davies, a retired environmental educator, has the Atlas block, a nine-square-mile area that includes most of Bay Lake. She will spend about 20 hours in the area between now and August, and may return next year for additional field surveys.

You may receive a letter requesting permission for her to spend some time watching birds on your property because you may have one or more habitats that attract bird species that she has not yet recorded in this Atlas block. Bird observations are not identified as being on any particular property in the block. If you give permission, she will assume full responsibility for her welfare and be careful to not disturb you or your property.

If you want a list of the birds observed, let her know. In addition, she would be grateful to receive any information that you may have about birds nesting on or near your property.
