2011 starting well for milfoil control

We continue our plan to control Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake as we have in previous years. We began our annual spring survey just before Memorial Day and will plan on treatments before the end of June.

The weather has been on our side the last couple of years and this year is off to a similar cool, wet start. We had good snow cover this winter, which with the current weather conditions should work in our favor again this year. With that said, the EWM is not going to go away, rather it should be a little easier to control.

Last year we saw strong native growth actually displacing the EWM in some cases. We treated approximately 105 acres at a cost of \$110,000 and expect about the same this year. We will have a new five-year Lake Vegetation Management Plan in place this year similar to what we had the last five years with the DNR. This is a great tool that makes it very easy to work with the DNR and conduct our program.

Still need approvals

We still need some signatures, so if you have not sent yours in, please do so or we will not treat



your shoreline. This not only affects you but your neighbors as well.

We will send out our shoreline inspection request later in August. This is a very important part of our program. Your participation has helped immensely over the years, and we ask that you would continue to be involved.

Important to build reserves

While our costs have been lower the last few years because of weather conditions, we have to accept that there will be years ahead with little snow cover, low water and/or hot and sunny, drought conditions, making for explosive EWM growth like we experienced four or five years ago. Everyone has done a fantastic job of supporting our cause, but the last few years' donations have been down and we have spent more than we have taken in. If everyone could give just a little more, it would go a long way in closing the gap.

It is important to have a reserve. Without the reserve we would have been in big trouble in 2006-2008, when we needed to spend significantly extra dollars with little notice to address what at the time was very explosive EWM growth. That extra spending proved to be worthwhile, as that large fall treatment was very successful, especially because the next spring the weather pattern broke to more favorable conditions for our control program.

Thank you for your continued support of our program. We can control EWM, and we will continue to do so with your help.

County passes new land use ordinance

In March, Crow Wing County passed a new Land Use Ordinance, effective April 22, which governs all properties that are outside individual city limits and lie above the Ordinary High Water line.

The county states that rather than using a one-size-fits-all approach to land use, it will implement site-specific performance standards such as stormwater management, vegetated buffers and septic system maintenance. Key areas the new ordinance addresses are Land Use (Zoning) Classification Changes, Shoreland Alteration Permits, Impervious Surface Coverage, Stormwater Runoff, Shoreline Buffer Zones and Setback Requirements. The ordinance also requires that a county staff member conduct an onsite visit before issuing any land use permits and that the Development Review Team hold a pre-application meeting for all projects that go to a public hearing, such as variances and conditional use permits.

DNR wants to give up... BLIA efforts to increase Bay Lake walleye population continue

Bay Lake is blessed with Good Fishing! Excellent crappies and bass — OK, sunfish — but walleyes are almost non-existent.

The problem is a severe overabundance of small hammer handle northern pike (NP). Based on the 2008 DNR netting, Bay Lake's NP population is four times the state average, while the walleye population is less than 1/3 the state average.

These trends have worsened over the last 10 years. Over the last eight years the BLIA has aggressively worked with the DNR to increase walleye stocking and develop a plan to control the NP population. We have not been successful. In fact, the DNR Lake Management for Bay Lake indicates that unless the NP population is brought under control in the next several years, it will stop all walleye stocking in Bay Lake.

The DNR acknowledges the goal they set is not realistic nor obtainable. Simply put, they will give up on Bay Lake and put their resources elsewhere. We, however, will not give up and will continue to pursue alternatives with the DNR.
