### Another year without Zebra Mussels

In case you missed it in the October Bay Lake e-mail blast: Zebra Mussels (ZM) have not been found on Bay Lake docks, lifts and boats that have been removed for the winter. While we cannot be absolutely sure, it appears we have managed to dodge a ZM infestation for one more year. We can't get overly confident, however. The DNR (Department of Natural Resources) added several new lakes to its list in 2016 - a total of 35 in Crow Wing County. (See the list of infested Crow Wing County lakes on Page 3.)

Unfortunately, Bay Lake is surrounded by lakes with ZM. So, we will continue our aggressive prevention program in 2017 with daily inspectors from mid-May through mid-October.

### **County Assessment of Prevention Practices**

Over an early October weekend, Crow Wing County surveyed boaters as they launched or removed boats from lake accesses. According to county staff, the results show that 94 percent of Crow Wing County respondents and 90 percent overall at least "somewhat agree" that the current county advertising and messaging

has inspired them to use AIS (aquatic invasive species) prevention practices in the future. And, approximately 95 percent at least "somewhat agree" that they feel well informed about actions they need to take with watercraft and water-related accessories concerning AIS.

### **AIS Invader Conference**

In early October, I attended the second annual AIS Invader Conference in St. Cloud. It is organized by the Minnesota Lakes and Rivers Advocacy (MLRA), a group that lobbies the state legislature on AIS and lakeshore property tax issues, and The Initiative Foundation, which grants funds to new AIS projects. BLIA is a dues-paying MLRA member and supports its activities, as do I.

About 250 AIS-minded folks attended, representing counties from around the state, lake associations, DNR and companies selling related products and services. More than **AIS**, continued on Page 3

### Summer 2016 weather helps native plants thrive over EWM

This year Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Bay Lake was spread out as usual, but not as dense and over not as many acres as we were concerned it might be earlier in the season.

We conducted a spring lake survey in May and early June, followed by treatment of 11 acres of EWM, mainly in high traffic areas or near shorelines that were going to be highly impacted by summer EWM growth.

25 sessions were offered on subjects such as "New and Hybrid Aquatic Invaders," "Closing Pathways of Infestation," "Successes in Stopping AIS Infestation" and "Pilot Projects for Innovation and Decontamination." Suffice it to say that there is much being done around the state as authorities and volunteers struggle to protect Minnesota waters. DNR continues to point out that fewer than 2 percent of 11,000+ Minnesota recreational lakes are infested with AIS, but it sure seems higher than that in our neighborhood.

The AIS prevention program is only possible through the generous contributions to the Environmental Protection Fund made by many BLIA members. Thank you for your past support, and please keep BLIA in mind when making 2016 year-end donations.

Phillip Rollins AIS prevention With all the cloudy weather, rain, high water and fairly normal temperatures, the native species outperformed the EWM, keeping it in check throughout the summer.

We conducted our fall survey in late August and early September, followed by treatments of approximately 115 sites equaling 40 acres in the second week of October. These were mostly small sites or very long, narrow strips of EWM. The conditions were perfect, and I am confident the fall treatments will be a success, and will hope for the winter weather to be on our side with normal snowfall and ice-out going into next season.

Thanks to everyone for your support of our EWM control program. It works very well, and we will continue on again next year.
